Proposed ACDCC Versatility Award Program by Chuck Lamers



In 2009, Ann Gunderson, Maureen Fanthorpe and I pulled together a proposal for an Australian Cattle Dog Club of Canada Versatility Awards program.

As it says in the attached proposal outline, the ACDCC Versatility awards program was implemented by the ACDCC for two reasons: -

- an educational tool for members to promote the health, soundness and welfare of Australian Cattle Dogs, and
- a recognition program for dogs and owners who have contributed to the breed in the arenas of performance, conformation and social responsibility.

The ACDCC Versatility Awards are intended to encourage the participation of ACDs in the many Canadian Kennel Club activities and other recognized Dog Sport and Canine recognition programs, to acknowledge an individual dog's accomplishments, and to acknowledge the versatility of the ACD breed.

This program is a tiered approach and will encourage the hard-core enthusiast in one area (herding or conformation or obedience as examples) to go out to the field, into the ring or into the training centre to try other disciplines. The program does not require the owner to go all the way—rather, getting a point in the show ring or getting a novice performance title in herding or obedience will be recognized and used towards the program. It also recognizes responsible ACD ownership.

The proposal was circulated to board members in 2009 and it was my intention to present it at the 2009 ACDCC Specialty and AGM in October, but with only 3 voting members present at the ACDCC Specialty, no AGM took place. As it was supported by the 2009 ACDCC Board of Directors, I would like to submit it for promotion to the membership via HH.

I will also follow-up to have the forms pdf'd and place on the ACDCC website for download. I hope we will be able to create a link to post photos and bios of all ACDs who qualify for and receive their ACDCC Versatility Award title.

Australian Cattle Dog Club of Canada Versatility Awards Program

The ACDCC Versatility awards program was implemented by the ACDCC for two reasons:

- an educational tool for members to promote the health, soundness and welfare of Australian Cattle Dogs and
- a recognition program for dogs and owners who have contributed to the breed in the arenas of performance, conformation and social responsibility.

There are five levels of awards, to recognize and reward dogs and owners from a beginning level to those who have achieved the pinnacle of success in one or several of the targeted areas •

Versatility Started (VS) requires five (5) points from at least 3 different categories, with at least one point coming from a performance category. VS title to be place as a suffix (end of dog's name). A certificate will be awarded.

Versatility Intermediate (VI) requires ten (10) points from at least 3 different categories, including at least two novice level 2-point titles in at least 2 performance categories. VI title to be place as a suffix (end of dog's name). A certificate will be awarded.

Versatility Excellent (VX) requires fifteen (15) points from at least 4 different categories, including at least 2 performance categories; dog must achieve an intermediate level title (minimum 5 points) in a performance category. VX title to be place as a suffix (end of dog's name). A certificate will be awarded.

Versatility Champion (VCH) requires twenty (20) points from at least 4 different categories, including at least 3 performance categories; dog must achieve at least one performance advance level titles (minimum 7 points) and one performance intermediate level title (minimum 5 points). VCH title to be place as a prefix (beginning of dog's name). A certificate and plaque will be awarded.

Versatility Master Champion (VMCH) requires twenty-five (25) points from at least 5 different categories, including at least 3 performance categories **and** a Conformation Championship; dog must achieve one advance performance level title (minimum 7 points) and two intermediate performance titles (minimum 5 points). VMCH title to be place as a prefix (beginning of dog's name). A certificate and plaque will be awarded.

Ten different categories have been identified in which points can be earned.

Titles/certificates must be awarded from recognized registries, agencies or dog sport organizations. The approved organizations are listed at the top of each category column.

The first five categories (A-E) are performance categories. Categories A-H recognize achievements based on a point-value. Points in these 8 categories are not cumulative. Points will be credited for the highest title achieved in each category A-H. The dog must have passed the test or accomplishment listed in order to be awarded point value. Achievements/certificates acquired in categories R & M are valued one point each, to a maximum of 7 points in each category. If used for points, C.E.R.F certificate must be renewed annually for the points to be counted in successive years. The chart listing the categories and point-earning achievements is provided.

The program is designed to make versatility awards at some level accessible for all dogs and all owners. For example, if a dog does not have the health credentials and/or conformation quality to be a breeding prospect, the dog can still earn points in the "Responsible Ownership" category by being spayed or neutered, in recognition of the owners' responsible decision not to breed that dog. A dog whose hips or elbows do not certify, but whose owner has chosen to have the OFA results posted on the OFA's database may earn a point for each OFA public database listing. Dogs who do certify can earn extra points for those certifications.

The ACDCC Versatility Awards year runs from Sept 1 to August 31. Thus all titles and certificates must have been earned no later than August 31 of the year in which the ACDCC Versatility Awards are presented in conjunction with the National Specialty and AGM. All ACDCC Versatility Awards information must be submitted by regular mail to the ACDCC Versatility Awards Committee no later than September 1 of the applicable awards year. Information received after that deadline will not be considered. Cost for each application is \$25.00 (non-refundable) and must accompany the application and documentation.

Applicants must be a member in good standing of the ACDCC for 2 or more years. The applicant must have owned or co-owned the dog when the dog earned at least one title listed from the categories A-H.

Written documentation is required for all earned points. Applicants must send copies (non-returnable) of all titles, certificates, etc. as proof that the dog has earned the title or accomplishment. Any questions of eligibility shall be resolved by the ACDCC Board.

Circle the first two weekends in June on your calendar! The ACD Club of Canada is holding the ACD National Specialty in Alberta.

A Specialty provides the rare opportunity to meet lots of cattledogs and their people. Best of all, you get to watch many of these dogs in action. There is no other way to see so many cattledogs in one place at one time.

If you have ever been perplexed or overwhelmed by a cattle dog's determination and tenacity, you must see cattle dogs in action, herding cattle. Seeing them work at the job they were originally bred to do can make it much easier to understand and marvel at the breed.

The first weekend of the Canadian Specialty will be in Edmonton on June 4 - 7, with conformation, obedience, rally-o, agility and CGN. The following weekend in Calgary, June 11 – 13, will showcase herding talents, including three arena trials, one stock dog trail and one specialty ACD arena trial.

Conformation will offer official and unofficial classes, including Brace, Altered, Herding Dog, Breeder Group, etc. There will be a breed Parade, Sweeps for Veterans, Puppies and Herding Titled dogs, and maybe Properties Classes too.

The ACD arena trial offers the rare chance to see ACDs herd cattle on an outdoor course that simulates a working ranch. They will move not just three cattle, but a group of 7 or more! The course will require getting around a variety of obstacles such as trailers, sorting chutes, pens and the like.

If you want to enter your dog in any of the events, the dog must have CKC registration, or have an ERN (Event Registration Number) or PEN (Performance Event Number). (Check out the CKC website at www.ckc.ca.)

CKC Herding Rep News - 2010

New Herding Showcase for CKC Trials!!!

An enthusiastic group of people have put together a new and exciting windup for year end stats of our CKC Herding Dogs!! For years, there have been discussions on the *best* way to count the year end statistics, and volunteers have spent hours adding scores and trial results.

This year, there is going to be a Championship Trial to decide that honour!! If all goes well, this will become an annual event. Dogs must qualify in order to compete. The rules below explain how a dog can qualify.

In 2010, the showcase will be held on October 2 & 3, at Tee Creek Herding Facility near Niagara Falls, Ontario. The trials will be followed by a 2-day judging/trial scoring seminar (judging all trial venues). These seminars are a super way for competitors to learn how judges are scoring them – they are NOT just for judges as their name suggests!

2011 Showcase will come out West - and will be hosted by the Downriver crew!

The winner will be posted in Dogs in Canada - and have several other *bragging rights* as the top dog in Canada!!

So - here are the rules for 2010:

2010 CKC Year End Herding Showcase Rules & Guidelines

This will be a CKC non-sanctioned event.

This will be open to all handlers/dogs competing in CKC arena herding trials whether, or not, they are a resident of Canada.

The Finals "year" will run from September 1st - August 31st. This gives us a month to get everything together before the finals trials.

The top 5 scores, from arena trials on all livestock, will be added together to determine placements for the finals. I will keep track of this over the year and will post a monthly list to Herding Canada so competitors can check where they are in the standings. I'll also try to add a page to my website with the same information on it.

The top 10 started, top 10 intermediate and top 20 advanced dogs will be invited to compete in the finals.

The finals trials for 2010 will be held the first weekend in October.

The finals trials will consist of two runs. The scores from the two runs will be added together to determine the top Started, Intermediate and Advanced dogs. Even if the run is not a Q, it will still be added to the other run. If a handler runs out of time, or calls time, the score that they have acquired to that point will be used.

Because the Intermediate and Advanced levels have a higher level of difficulty the total scores will be weighted as follows: Started - total score, Intermediate - total score plus 3%, Advanced - total score plus 6%.

The dog with the highest total score will be awarded the prize of Top Herding Dog in Canada.

Placement rosettes and prizes will be given at each level.

Large rosettes and prizes will be awarded to the Top Started, Intermediate, Advanced and Top Herding Dog.

Finals trials will be run as arena trials on sheep.

Trials will be judged by CKC licensed judges.

For 2010 the trials will be held at Tee Creek Training Centre in Welland, Ontario (near Niagara Falls). They are located about 1 hour from Buffalo and Hamilton airports and approximately 1 1/2 hours from Toronto. Dave Harris and Kathy Warner have a lovely facility with a very nice arena setup and great stock to work.

The finals trials will be followed up with a judges seminar. This is open to everyone, not just judges. Some of the suggested topics, for the seminar, include: what judges look for in each association (CKC, AKC, ASCA & AHBA), how to design and set up a CKC course, trial secretary - what they need to do and when it needs to be done, "how would you judge this" - video taped runs. We are always open to more suggestions.

Stages of Life by Ellen Schwab



When the puppies were days old, I kept them under my dinette in a standard dog crate, and Jaz hopped in and out and spent most of her day with them. Feeding, cleaning bottoms, making sure they were warm.

When they got mobile enough to ooze over the ledge, we moved them to the living room into a puppy play pen. It's about 3' x 3' wire cage, with a false bottom for easy poop removal. Jaz still spent a large part of her day with them, but she took breaks.

At about 3 weeks, Jaz stops cleaning their butts, and they start pooping on their own. As soon as they could maneuver, we started directing them outside. Of course, we still had some poops and pees on the false bottom, but it was amazing how they cried to be let out, and how they learned "the way" to the popping station.

Once or twice, we had to urge them to the stairs and the door instead of wandering around the kitchen, but for the most part, they tumbled out of the pen, then tumbled down the 5 steps and made their way to the grass.

I called it my puppy water fall. It was exciting and funny and a little heart breaking as they tumbled and fell and rolled and regained control and motored toward the door. At times, they took some pretty big bounces and yet, they just righted themselves and got right back on track. It was exciting as they grew and their coordination improved, and they bounded rather than bounced. Craig Watson once told me, never do for your pups what they can do for themselves. So at first, I had to go outside and give them little boosts to get back up the steps. I never lifted them up, but I would raise their butts a bit, so that they could crawl up. One step at a time, I made them "climb" each step, with as little assistance from me as possible. Even on the way up, sometimes they lost their footing and bounced back to the bottom. I would crack up as they shook themselves off and charged back to the steps for another go.

Seven little determined, gorgeous creatures flowing down the stairs and then struggling back up. It was so beautiful and amazing. On the way down, sometimes, they would approach the edge of each step and try to reach out for the next . . lose their balance and tumble down, sometimes skidding or rolling all the way to the bottom. Sometimes they would LEAP, and tumble end over end all the way to the bottom. I was always astonished at how they took each tumble and set back as a normal part of life, and just got right back on track. As they grew and their coordination improved, my waterfall got "fuller", with seven fat little tubby puppies crowding the narrow stairs. It was always a magical moment when they raced to the door and made their way out. And, another moment of pride as they struggled to come back in. As they grew, they began to leap all the steps on the way out, and to streak up, often skipping a few steps in their race to the top.

I never expected to see the puppy water fall become a cycle of life. Now that my Pep is aging and struggling with his bad hip, he is just like the puppies. My once agile and precise Pep can no longer gracefully negotiate the steps, and at times tumbles and rolls on the way down. His rear legs can only heft so much and at times, he is not coordinated or strong enough to complete a step, and falls and slides to the bottom. Like the puppies, I now go outside and give him just enough boost so that he can climb one step at a time. I do not think I will ever be carrying him into the house, but for now, I can boost him and make sure he does not fall backward.

With the puppies it was joyous to see them bounce and rebound and roll and tumble and right themselves and go one. They progressed steadily toward more confidence, more strength and more agility. I keep that joy in my heart as I watch Pep struggle and fall, slowly losing his balance and his coordination. It is hard to watch my once athletic, agile and precise dog stagger and struggle. Luckily, he still has the determination and the fortitude that the pups showed. He just gets up and tries again, and gets on with his business. His eyes still shine. He still comes readily to join on walks, and he still keeps up . . . with one leg dragging at times. It is hard not to baby him when his leg gives out and he falls, or stumbles. But, we keep taking him along

and giving him a boost into the van, over a fallen log, or up the steps. Just like the puppies, he is happy to be going out and happy to be coming in. No matter the obstacle, he does not whine or give up. He just keeps trying until he gets over around or through.

If he is in any pain, he hides it well. I am sure the weakness in his muscles is his way of adapting to the pain. Each day, several times a day, as Pep makes his way up and down the steps, I remember the puppies and all their joy and potential. And, I remember all the amazing moments of joy, discovery, love, pride and accomplishment that Pep has given me over the years.

I have been very blessed to have him as my dog.

And, I will continue to give him only as much help as he needs to get over, around or through each obstacle he faces. My wish is that he will die peacefully in his sleep. Beside me. Knowing he is so very loved and admired. If that wish is not granted . . . I will do what needs done, when it needs done.
